



## **SAVING THE OCEANS**

**GERMANS AND INDONESIANS CREATE** "TASINI" - THE KEY TO **BREAK THE PLASTIC BAG HABIT IN INDONESIA** 

In the run up to the World Oceans Day, founders of environmental initiative Making Oceans Plastic Free (MOPF) are unveiling Tasini - a promising concept to replace the plastic bag in Indonesia, the second largest source of plastic pollution to the world's oceans. Tasini are reusable shopping bags made from recycled plastics that fold into marine animals who function as ecoambassadors. Unlike other reusable bags, interdisciplinary scientists developed Tasini to combine fashion, convenience and environmental awareness, to make plastic bag pollution a thing of the past.

According to the World Economic "Environmental conservation is often Forum, plastic waste will outweigh fish in the ocean by 2050. Indonesians use almost 10.000.000 plastic bags each day. New ideas to reduce plastic waste are urgently needed.

Since 2013, surfers and environmentalists, Paritosha Kobbe and Roger Spranz from Germany have spent much of their time conducting studies and living in Indonesia. Together with locals Lia Nirawati and Adith Nugroho, they founded the initiative Making Oceans Plastic Free (MOPF) and are now launching their social enterprise, Tasini.

## A single Tasini can replace up to 400 plastic bags a year.

Based on years of study, Tasini were designed as marine animals to promote awareness of the ecosystems the initiative aims to protect. Not only does the Tasini design connect with Asian cultures' love for playful and fun accessories, it is practical and convenient. The bags are foldable, water repellent, and unforgettable as a keychain.

about telling people what they should and shouldn't do" MOPF co-founder Roger Spranz says.

"That's why it often has this negative connotation. We believe that making it fun and easy to preserve our planet is much more effective and reaches people in a way that really motivates them to make a change."

After using their own funds to produce the first 1,000 Tasini, the founders are launching a crowdfunding campaign on Indiegogo. The goal is to produce Tasini bags from recycled plastic waste (PET) and to run a large-scale environmental awareness campaign in Indonesia. It's important to MOPF that Tasini are produced sustainably and - for greater impact - are affordable for as many people as possible. Among other perks, crowdfunding contributors can purchase one of the first edition handmade Tasini.

MOPF was founded by four friends that strongly believe in the power

Their work has been shared by Greenpeace, the UN Environmental Programme and the Indonesian youth initiative Bye Bye Plastic Bags, whose members will present to the General Assembly of the UN in New York, on World Oceans Day June 8th.








# REAL WASTE PIE CHART

On February 19th 2017, MOPF co-organized together with "One Island One Voice" Bali's biggest beach clean-up in history.


